Pauline Lovelock, Learning Project Officer at the Julian Centre in Norwich, explores the spirituality of Julian of Norwich and other English medieval mystics.

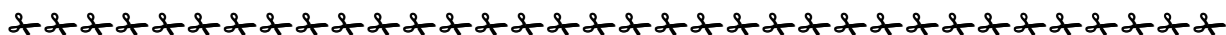
